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Forest Returns and Benefit Sharing An independent study on Community Forest Management in Andhra Pradesh

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. Introduction

In Andhra Pradesh, the Joint Forest Management (JFM) programme initiated in 1992 was transformed to Community Forest Management (CFM) in 2002 vide G.O.M.S number 13 Dt 12-02-2002. In response to the demand, seeking clarification on the modalities of benefit sharing, by the NGOs and the VSSs4 associated actively with the World Bank supported project, an extensive consultation was taken up by the AP Forest Department (facilitated by NGOs) at range and division levels, culminating at the State level. The outcome of the consultation resulted in an amendment to the GO issued on 12-01-2004, where the entitlements from forest return and benefit sharing mechanism was elaborately explained.



- Entitlements from Forest Returns:
- All Non-timber Forest Produce.
- All Intermediate yielding obtained from silvicultural operations in natural forests;
- All timber and bamboo (including yield from bamboo plantations) harvested from the forest managed by them except in case of plantations;
- In case of plantations within VSS area, entitlement from yield harvested (including yield from thinning) in the first rotation shall be proportionate to period of management of the plantation by the
- All the timber obtained from second and subsequent rotations of all plantations.
- All silvicultural operations including harvesting will be carried out in accordance with the silvicultural principles laid down in the respective Working Plans and schedule detailed in respective micro plans of the Vana Samrakshana Samithi.
- 100% of net profit from sale of beedi leaf.

VSS-Vana Samrakibana Samithis are the village level forest protection groups formed by the Forest Department. These groups are then allotted a part of the Reserve Forest under an MOU with the State Forest Department, for protection and management. In return there are pronouncements for sharing benefits with these communities. In Andhra Prudesh to far there are more than 8000 VSs looking after an extent of 16 lakk ha (25% of the State forest) of forest. World Bank supported APCFM project (2003-2010) provided funding for VSs activities to 5000 VSs and the rest are being supported by State and Central Government schemes.
