


1. Introduction

"Addaku" (Bauhinia Vahli) is available in plenty in Visakhapatnam forest circle and is one of the major sources of income for about 50,000 tribal leaf collectors living in the hilly regions of the forest circle. It was observed that the people who get a wage of Rs.20 a day, prefer to opt out from adda leaf collection owing to the physical and mental strain involved in the activity. The tribal men and women who reside in the regions are usually completely engaged during the period from April to July, as collection of leaves is intense during these months.

In the adjacent plains, thousands of women, (numbering around 50,000), belonging to the poorer sections of BC, and OC community (who are otherwise not allowed to go outside home for wage work due to cultural restrictions) depend on leaf plate making activity as a supplementary household income throughout the year.

The tribal women of the hilly regions were not into leaf plate making activity in a systematic way, though attempts had been made by Girijan Cooperative Corporation (GCC), Integrated Tribal Development Authority (ITDA) and Forest Department (FD) to train them in plate making. In the absence of a well-established forward market linkage, the women were not enthusiastic to pursue the activity. This was often perceived as "lack of interest among the tribal women."

Identifying the issues related to Adda leaf activity and tribals, Centre for People's Forestry (CPF) conducted few multi stakeholders' consultations which paved the way for a collaborative project in early 2005¹.

1.1. Project Brief

The project titled "Livelihood Enhancement through Adda Leaf Plate Making Activity in Visakhapatnam Forest Circle" was a collaborative initiative of CPF, APFD, GCC, Regional Resource Centre—Coastal (RRC-C) of CPF and the local NGOs. Care was taken to draw the roles and responsibilities of each of the agency clearly as given in the successive paragraphs.
