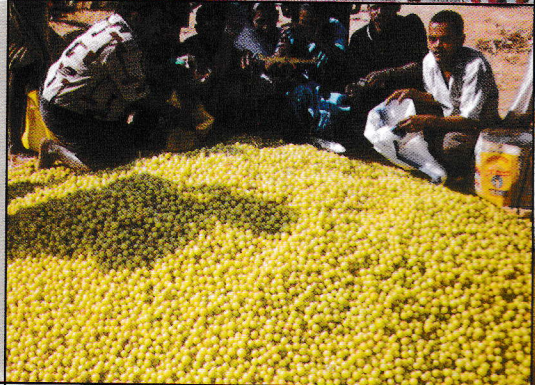
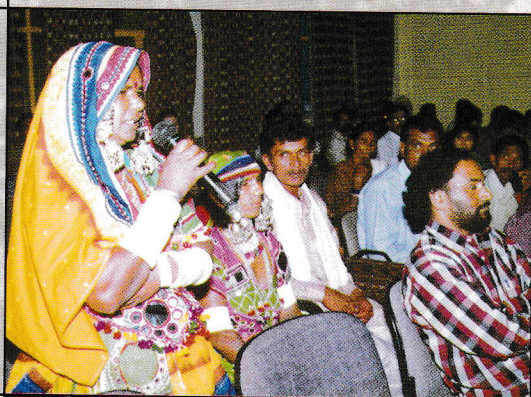

PREAMBLE



Stakeholder consultations on
Community Forest Management

Eversince it has been proposed to consider a shift from the ongoing Joint Forest Management to Community Forest Management, extensive discussions are going on, among all those who have been actively involved in the programme. The following are the concerns frequently expressed:

- * What does Community Forest Management actually mean?
- * How dose the Forest Department perceive and how do the communities view this?
- * Is the idea to cover entire programme across the State or is it limited to a specific area?
- * What is the role of NGOs in this attempt?
- * Is it really possible to operationalise this new concept?
- * What is the experience in the neighbouring States like Orissa where CFM seems to be already in practice, and what is the relevance of that experience to Andhra Pradesh?
- * What are the measures that enable the shift - as the Forestland belongs to the State?
- * Are communities really ready and/or capable to handle such responsibility?
- * Is there something in the concept that is not yet clearly enunciated to the public?

Discussions with the Forest Officials, NGOs and others reveal that there are no readily available answers to all the questions being raised. It is however clear that, the Government and the Forest Department are willing to bring in

this shift in the whole State, and are not thinking of confining it to any particular area. This assurance relieved some anxiety. Then, when asked for a definition, the Forest Department mentioned that, it would become clear as we go along. But the Department thinks CFM covers empowering the communities so that their livelihood aspects are addressed properly to the extent possible while managing the forest in a sustainable way. This has to be carried forward by all who are involved in the process.

Rather than viewing it as a received concept, the People concerned, the Foresters, the NGOs and all others interested need to develop a common understanding on Community Forest Management in our own context (models of other places may not fit in toto here, though they are helpful in giving some guidance) and try to evolve a definition that is acceptable to all the players.

It is in this background; the consultation process has been attempted. The understanding thus emerging is that – Community Forest Management is a Forest Management model, which enables the people living in Forest fringe areas to manage the designated forests as well as their livelihoods in a sustainable way. It may be reviewed and further evolved from time to time based on experiences. The role of foresters and NGOs will be of guiding and facilitating rather than controlling and regulating.



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A. Background

The A.P Forest Department has plans to go ahead with phase II of AP Forestry Project in the name of Community Forest Management in 14 districts of the State. Based on the experiences in Phase I of this project, varied perceptions were there among NGOs and other stakeholders. NGOs share the view that the communities need to be entrusted with decision making powers in respect of - planning, utilization of available funds, collection of fines from forest offenders, etc. The role of the Forest Department has to be of facilitating and guiding in respect of - technical matters such as silvicultural operations, booking cases of smuggling, evolving management plans as harvesting plan etc. The communities i.e., the VSSs have mixed views. At some places they are more confident while at others they still feel diffident.

In the meetings/workshops organized from time to time by different agencies, people used to make suggestions towards the improvement of the programme in respect of empowerment and related matters. In this background, it is felt desirable to take up consultations with the stakeholders at different levels and make the outcome available for incorporation into the project proposal for Phase II. It was felt that such an exercise would certainly benefit the people in the long run as their views will be given due importance in the Project design itself.

With the above background, a proposal for organising the stakeholder consultation meetings was prepared and the whole process has been finalised in consultation with the Forest Department.



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Winrock International was approached for financial support for all the workshops and they have come forward to extend support to the State level meeting. The matter was then discussed with the Forest Department and they have agreed to support the regional workshops.

It has then been decided to entrust the responsibility of organising regional meetings to CWS partner NGOs and the State level meeting to be organized by CWS involving all others (A.P. State level NGO Committee on JFM, AFPRO, SPWD) who are actively associated with the JFM programme in the State. 3 Inter Cooperation have extended support. AP State level Committee on JFM expressed willingness to participated in the regional meetings too.

B. Process

B-1 Regional Workshops:



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1. Dates and Venues:

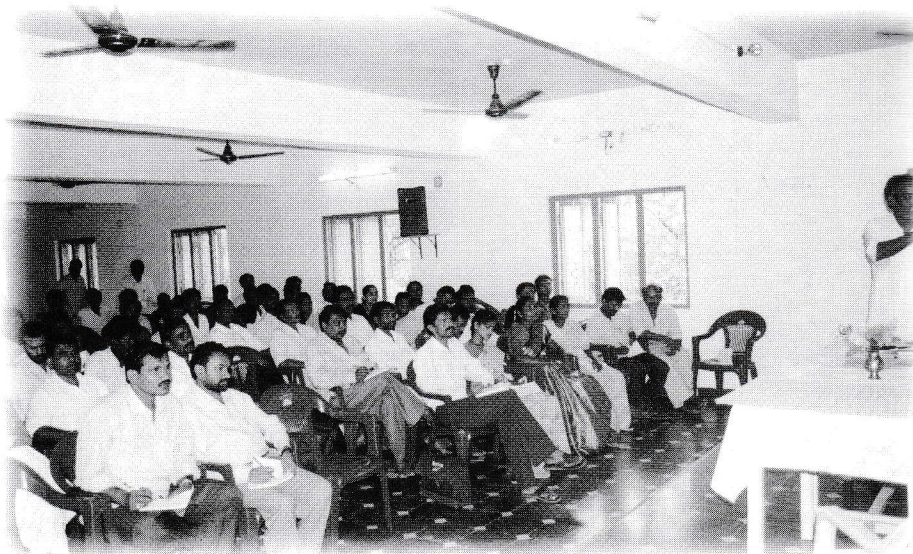


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2. Participants:

For the regional workshops are - VSS women members, VSS male members, NGO representatives, Forest department officials (both senior and field level) Academicians and other individuals interested in forestry aspects (List is at Annexure 1).



3. Variations:

In Visakhapatnam and Nirmal the workshop was organized for one day whereas in Warangal and Cuddapah it was organized for two days.

In Warangal, group discussions took place on the previous day. The outcome was presented to plenary on 29-6-2001 and based on the discussions; groups were formed again to discuss the remaining agenda.

In Cuddapah, there were only informal discussions on the previous day.

6. Formation of Groups:

Then discussions took place in the thematic groups involving all.

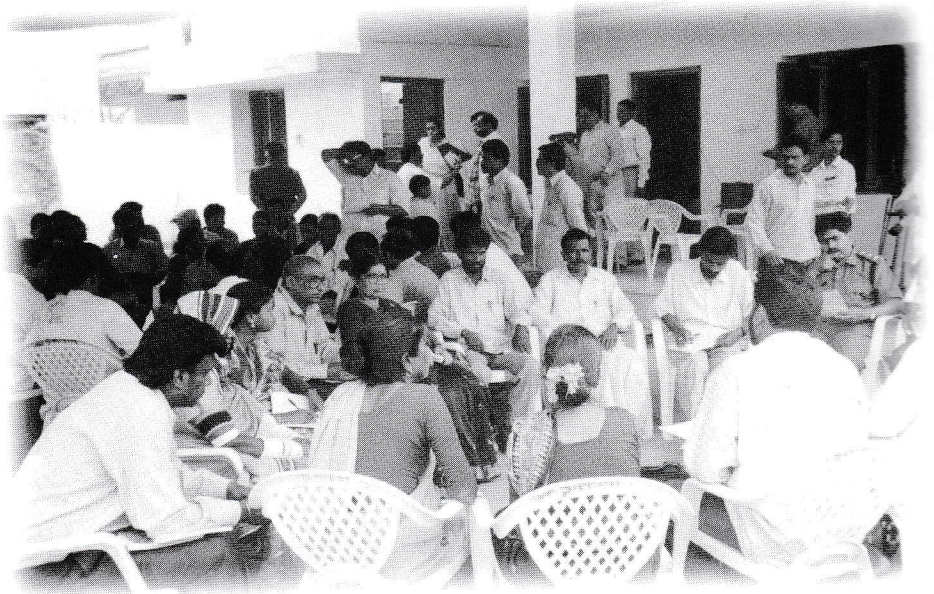

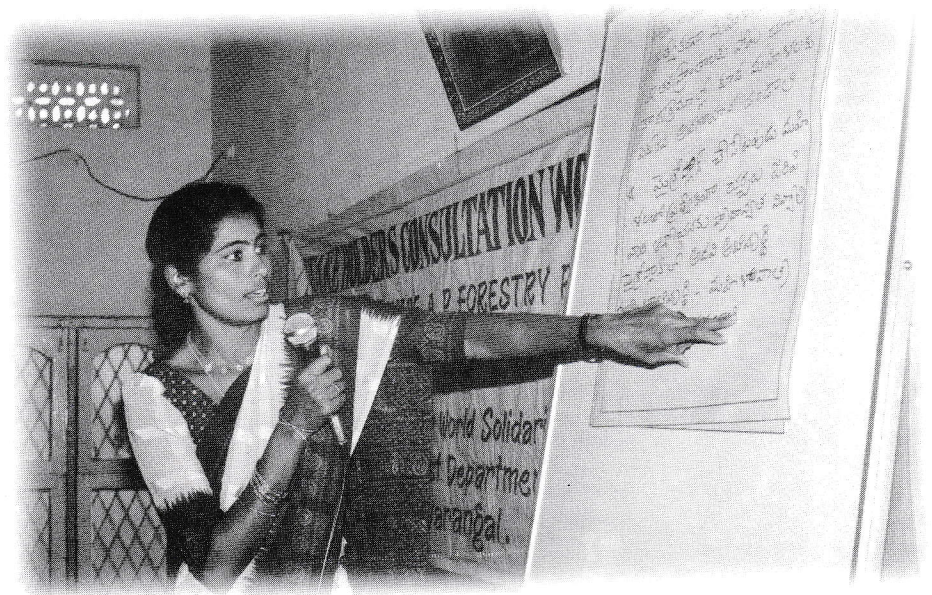

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While the VSS members participated in the meetings are more confident in Visakhapatnam and Cuddapah seeking for more powers and autonomy, those at Warangal and Nirmal are a bit diffident and are seemingly dependent on the officials in some aspects. In all places they are well aware of their responsibilities especially in protection. All of them requested for



consideration of their security during protection. Coming to linkages with Panchayats, the opinion expressed unequivocally is that the autonomy of the VSS institution has to be maintained and sharing the VSS Plans and Accouts etc., in the Grama sabha, may enable some coordination with the Panchayat. On the whole active and lively discussions took place in all places on all the themes proposed. Representatives for the state meeting were chosen.

8. Expenditure:

In Visakhapatnam regional workshop, Field officials of Forest Department have not claimed the travel charges. Senior officials have come on their own to all meetings, including the State level meeting.

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B-2 State level Meeting:

1. Date and Venue:

State level Workshop has been organized on 18-07-2001 in Hyderabad at Indo American Centre for international Studies (IACIS)



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2. Participants:

For the State meeting are Representatives from the regional meetings (@ four per district), Host organizations of regional meetings, Conservators of Forests of the concerned regions, State level NGO Committee on JFM, Members from Hyderabad based organizations, Universities, Representatives from - the State Forest Department, The World Bank and the Resource agency (Winrock international) and eminent persons interested in Forestry and related matters. List of participants is at Annexure 9

3. Programme:

Programme schedule is at Annexure 10. Reports on all regional workshops printed in Telugu and a summary report in English are made available to participants at the State level meeting.

4. Inaugural Address:

Sri K. Subba Rao (PCCF) , in his inaugural address, has reiterated on the importance of stakeholder consultations. It has been stated that the



Forest Department has realized the importance of involving different stakeholders during the implementation of JFM. Therefore, the responsibility of organizing the consultation meetings is entrusted to CWS and its sister organizations to enable broader stakeholder representation and to accommodate varied perceptions.



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Mr. Rao further observed that Community Forest Management is an initiative sequential to JFM to improve the space of people and their livelihoods. Any limitation during JFM should be viewed in the light of the commitment shown by AP Forest Department to transform from its culture that has been rooted for the past 100 years. Sharing gains and mistakes alike would help to leap forward; and therefore, this consultation should help us in integrating - the people's expectations and aspirations, development orientation of NGOs and forest department as facilitator in its regulatory role. The purpose is to better utilize the World Bank loan and create desired impact in forestry, and forest communities: "Each rupee spent should be - for the best cause of the society". He then requested the participants to think of a clear exit plan so that there won't be any need for another phase.



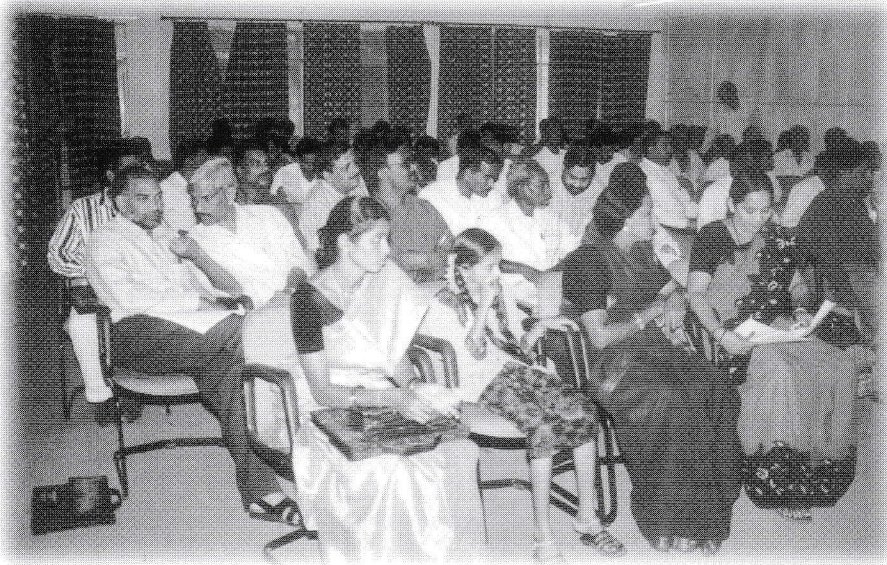
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Areas that acquire importance with CFM

- ☐ Improve upon general guidelines prepared in JFM keeping in view of requirements of CFM.
- ☐ To look into various decisions with a view to interwine forest management and livelihoods.
- ☐ Economic empowerment becomes important in the context of self-management and hence value addition to forest produce, medicinal plants, etc need an emphasis.
- ☐ Positive policies required for sustainable resource management and constructive dependence on forests for the forest based societies to ensure sustainable village management.

5. Presentation on the outcome of Regional workshops:

Dr. Suryakumari made a presentation on the outcome of the regional workshops (circulated in the meeting). Mr. Ramesh Kalaghatigi (CF), who chaired that session mentioned that the aspect discussed at Nirmal meeting in respect of *"making provision for Dalit Development plan"* was not covered in the presentation. While on the subject, the following discussion took place.



The identification of Drinking habit and illiteracy as the issues concerning Dalits at regional meetings was seriously and painfully objected to and the feeling was that Dalit issues were not properly articulated. Dalits



are being subjected to severe pressure due to – Globalisation impact which reduced their number of work days as Agriculture labourers on the one hand and as they are landless they are compelled to go to forest land to meet subsistence needs which is being reclaimed while demarcating VSS area on the other.



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6. Discussions:

While all the issues raised and solutions suggested in the regional meetings were generally accepted, the following attracted further discussion:

- ❑ There should be no duplication of efforts in promoting women SHGs in VSS villages. SHGs promoted as part of VSSs should receive all the support extended by Government & NGOs - to DWACRA groups.



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- ❑ Vice Chair person position has to be created in the Managing committee and either Chairperson or Vice chair person should be a woman (to enhance leadership among women)
- ❑ Woman facilitator has to be identified from among the VSS community by VSS themselves. (So that she can have involvement)



- ❑ VSS to be empowered to levy fines in forest offences (towards empowerment and confidence building)
- ❑ VSSs to be allowed to install and manage check posts (,,)
- ❑ Institutional mechanisms should be put in place to address corruption issues (So that FD officials, NGOs and VSSs - all could be made accountable)
- ❑ Regarding the linkages between VSS and Panchayats, animated discussion took place. VSS Women members too expressed their views strongly. At the end, it has been agreed that for the present, some coordination can be maintained with Panchayats by sharing the plans and Accounts etc., in the Gramasabha.

C. Recommendations



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The recommendations made during regional meetings were all agreed to. In addition, few additional points came up during the state meeting.

Recommendations of the whole consultation process have been grouped into the following categories under each of the themes identified:

1. Implementation strengthening
2. Rules & Regulations
3. Policy Related
4. Capacity Building
5. Project Management

The logic behind the recommendation is mentioned in parenthesis.

A. Issues related to Marginalised groups (Women, Dalits and Tribals) and their Livelihoods

Implementation strengthening

- ▼ Women development has to be incorporated in the micro plan. (So that it can be regularly monitored)
- ▼ Equal wages are to be paid to women.
- ▼ Field officials of forest department and NGOs are to be sensitized about women's involvement (They themselves have reservations in respect of women's involvement)
- ▼ Each VSS should have sub committee to discuss women's issues (to have persistent effort)

- ▼ Clear indicators are to be defined in the beginning itself to measure women's involvement. (So that it becomes mandatory)
- ▼ Woman facilitator should be there from the beginning and from among the VSS community chosen by them. (So that women will not lag behind and the involvement of facilitator will be more. Previous experience is that most of the women facilitators ended up as clerks in Range offices)

Rules & Regulations

- ✿ Provision has to be made for women to take an accompanying person to attend trainings at distant places. (To cross the barriers of socio cultural limitations)

Policy Related

- ❖ One-woman member should be a signatory in the Joint account. (To get them involved)
- ❖ Representation of women in MC to be made 50%. (So that they have numerical strength to express and to influence decisions in their favour)
- ❖ Vice Chairperson position has to be created in the Managing Committee and either Chairperson or Vice chairperson should be a woman (to enhance leadership among women).
- ❖ Single women and women belonging to land less class should become automatic members in VSS (to safeguard their interest against any human errors).
- ❖ Specific measures are to be spelt out to safe guard the interests of non-tribals who are dependant on forest and not members of VSS. (To avoid conflicts and to respect the traditional Forest dependence of non – tribal people)



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- ❖ As work created is only for few days benefits from timber sale are to be completely (100%) given to VSS. (to address the livelihood concerns of poor esp. Dalits)
- ❖ Wherever **dalits are making a living** on encroached forest such areas are to be excluded from demarcation as VSS forest. (Dalits are being subjected to land alienation. With VSS formation their encroached lands too were reclaimed making them more vulnerable).
- ❖ Special measures to be proposed to **Dalits** whose land were reclaimed or VSS formation. (This is to take care of their subsistence needs)

Capacity Building

- ✿ Technical trainings are to be imparted to women (For their empowerment)
- ✿ Special training to women, Dalit and tribal members in Management aspects (For their empowerment)
- ✿ Networks of women, Dalit and Tribal members are to be Strengthened, (For their empowerment)

Project Management

- The VSS s that encourage equality of women are to be provided with incentives. (So that others can follow)
- Financial support to be extended to establish small enterprises (economic empowerment to women)
- All VSS should have thrift groups and they are to be linked with banks. (economic empowerment to women)

- **Dalit Development plan** has to be designed as in case of Tribal development plan designed during Phase I. (so that their livelihood situation improves)
- Support has to be extended to tribals and Dalits so that their lands are not encroached by landlords. (Since they are vulnerable and helpless State support is needed)
- Financial support has to be extended to tribal people to cultivate wastelands (for lack of investment they are either losing the land to land lords in way of encroachment or compelled to leave it as waste land)
- Required resources are to be provided for agriculture development in VSS area. (to reduce pressure on forests and to improve livelihood situation)
- Fish rearing to be encouraged in the water bodies in around VSS forests. (As a supplementary source of income)

B. VSS Management

Implementation strengthening



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- * Micro plan has to be prepared by - VSS members, FD officials and NGOs together. (to have involvement of all concerned from the beginning)
- * Information about micro plan preparation has to be provided to members one week ahead and then only it has to be attempted before the VSS members (so that others too can).
- * Resources for village development to be identified and then activities to be planned.
- * All the members should take responsibility for protection. Collection of fines from disinterested persons to be introduced.



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- * Dimensions of fire lines are to be increased and they are to be laid every year.
- * Dimensions of contour trenches are to be location specific
- * MOU between the VSS and Forest department should be clear and detailed.
- * It should be made clear to people that they are entitled to the benefits whether there is a project supporting VSS activities or not.
- * Range level review meetings are to be organized by NGOs
- * All records are to be maintained by VSS
- * Care to be taken that land under dispute is not allotted to VSS. (Otherwise people may loose confidence)

Rules & Regulations

- ★ Beat officers / ABOs are to be made member secretaries so that the burden of FSOs is lessened. Funds are to be released to VSS without delay.
- ★ Benefits are to be shared among the members listed in the micro plan only.
- ★ Benefit sharing should be among the members who participate in the works.
- ★ From among the benefits of the VSS some amount has to be kept aside for future use.
- ★ VSS members who regularly participate in work should get more share in usufruct than the name sake members (to serve as incentive for participation)

Policy Related

- ◆ Wherever there are more VSSs continuously, they are to be allowed to have check post and regulate for effective protection.
- ◆ VSS should be empowered to levy and collect C-fees in smuggling cases.
- ◆ GCC monopoly has to be abolished - wherever VSSs are confident of safe guarding their interests.
- ◆ 100% of the timber sale proceeds are to be shared by VSS members
- ◆ Guidelines in respect of the benefit sharing mechanisms are to be developed.
- ◆ VSS should have legal sanctity
- ◆ Insurance facility has to be provided to persons involved in protection.(to ensure security)
- ◆ VSS chairperson has to convene the meetings and minute the proceedings
- ◆ 50% of the committee members should be women
- ◆ Joint account has to be in the name of chairperson and a committee member of whom one should be a woman
- ◆ One member from the MC has to be designated as treasurer and be responsible for accounts maintenance and record keeping etc.(to enable VSS to own up management responsibility)
- ◆ VSS has to be empowered to bookcases of smuggling up to a certain amount and the upper limit has to be fixed. (to empower the VSS)



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Capacity Building

- + Each VSS should have marketing advisory committee consisting of members from VSS, FD, GCC, and NGO.
- + Trainings to be imparted to the VSS members on marketing related aspects.
- + From among the members of the Executive committee, two or three persons have to form into small groups and these groups have to take responsibility for specific tasks in VSS E.g.: NTFP collection, SMC works etc.(enhance participation and leadership building)
- + Trainings on organization and documentation of monthly meetings, record maintenance and book keeping.

Project Management

- ❖ Annual plan has to be prepared by Chairman, members and officials and has to be approved by General body and a copy of the same has to be shared with the Panchayat.
- ❖ Funds are to be released immediately after the submission of the annual plans.
- ❖ At the end of each year plan has to be reviewed along with the micro plan and the deviations if any (with appropriate explanations) have to be recorded
- ❖ Alternative livelihood opportunities are to be created to forest dependant communities.
- ❖ Facilities to store forest produce have to be created.

C. VSS – NGO –FD Coordination

Implementation strengthening

- ❑ FD officials and NGOs need to participate in the monthly meetings regularly and Monthly meetings should be organized regularly (to involve members)
- ❑ FD has to - share information about the work to be carried out before hand, maintain good relations with VSS and NGO, play supervising and monitoring role, guide the VSS in management aspects and guard against irregularities and extend support to VSS members in - technical matters such as estimating the potential of available NTFP etc. and in – conflict situations. (this creates an enabling environment for the successful implementation of the programme).

Rules & Regulations

- ❑ The committee has to be made accountable for the mistakes if any. (So far only the FD officials are made responsible).

Policy Related

- ❑ NGOs presence in all meetings of VSS and FD has to be made mandatory.(so that local officials can not exclude them)



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Capacity Building

- ❑ NGOs should be involved in capacity building of VSS in - Microplan preparation, trainings, awareness building and motivation.(As they have the required time and skill)
- ❑ NGO should see that VSS gets schemes through other line departments.(to make VSS Institution sustainable)

- ❑ NGOs have to guide VSS in lobbying, advocacy matters.(so that VSS can become self reliant)



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Project Management

- Member from ITDA and VDO are to be made members of the VSS managing committee and they have to perform their assigned duties without fail.(To ensure coordination at village level)

D. Forestry and Related aspects

Implementation strengthening

- * SMC works need to be finalized in consultation with VSS members and according to the nature of soil and other conditions.
- * Conservation and plantation of naturally existing plants need to be given priority.

Rules & Regulations

- FSR rates are to be fixed based on local conditions and expenditure involved in consultation with VSS networks.

Capacity Building

- Training in raising medicinal plants, nurseries, estimating the potential of forest produce and on marketing.
- Training in grafting and silvi cultural operation
- Required training has to be imparted to VSS members on SMC works.
- Trainings are to be organized at range, division and circle levels.
- Exposure trips are to be organized.
- Videotapes of model VSS are to be shown in other VSSs for inspiration.

Project Management

- In the coastal areas Palmyrah palm plantation along with Casuarinas has to be encouraged.
- Sample plots are to be raised before introducing hybrid / Clonal plantations.
- Intensive plantation to be taken up in a small area.
- Clearing plants should not be practiced.
- Dimensions of contour trenches have to be according to the local conditions.
- Rock fill dams are to be constructed only to small canals.
- Introduction of pot drip irrigation has to be considered.

E. Conflicts and Resolution Mechanisms

Implementation strengthening

- * Rules regarding the term of VSS committee has to be strictly enforced (Continuation of the same committee for a longer time, leads to conflicts in VSS)



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Rules & Regulations

- * Guidelines on Benefit sharing mechanisms to be developed (Expectation of benefits by members of VSS who are not participating in works.)
- * Members of both VSSs are to be involved during demarcation of contiguous VSSs (to avoid border disputes)
- * Grazing and fuel wood management plans are to be prepared taking into consideration the requirements of non-VSS villagers too



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and incorporated in the micro plans (to avoid conflicts due to Grazing and fuel wood requirements).

- Traditional Forest dependent non-tribals are to be allowed to collect Forest produce in the non-VSS forest area (Now only tribal people have the right to collect MFP in the entire RF area whereas others do not have such right).
- Some coordination with the Panchayat is to be maintained (Variation in the village development activities in VSS and non-VSS villages of a single Panchayat could then be addressed properly.)

Policy Related

- ★ Grazing policy has to be evolved

Capacity Building

- ☆ On conflict resolution mechanisms to VSS, NGO and FD officials

Project Management

- All VSSs in a district/range are to be supported through one scheme or common modalities have to be worked out for all the schemes. (To avoid conflicts arising out of differences in the schemes that support VSSs.)

F. VSS and Panchayat Linkages

In General in all the workshops it has been expressed that VSS should function as an independent Institution maintaining its autonomy but some linkages are to be maintained with the Panchayats. The following suggestions have come up regarding the coordination between VSS and Panchayats.

-
- VSS has to be formed in the **true** Grama Sabha.
 - Sarpanch should be invited as a guest to VSS meetings.
 - VSS resolutions are to be shared with Panchayat.
 - VSS accounts, expenditure has to be presented to the Grama Sabha for social audit.
 - ***A rule has to be made in the Panchayat Raj Act*** enabling VSS to manage the forest allotted to avoid conflicts in Scheduled areas.
